

Make your present self happy, it is worth it!


I would like to see greater awareness and support for care experienced and estranged students the whole way through the education system.

I felt very unsupported at school. I was told in high school by my guidance teacher that "university wasn't for me". I think there is a lot of stigma for care experienced and estranged students.

I didn't get good grades in high school due to the trauma and difficulties I had gone through. I had to go to college for 4 years before getting into university and although I got an A in my HNC college course, only one university let me in. I felt judged by the fact I did not get good grades in high school but it was hard for me to focus in school due to living on "survival mode" for so long.

I have benefitted from the Unite Foundation Scholarship by getting 3 years free accommodation and it has given me a lot of independence and respite from caring roles within my family. My flat is a safe space where I can focus on me, myself and my future.

I am lucky at my university. We have a team for care experienced and estranged students, I have someone I can go to if I am struggling or need advice or a rant.









University wasn't something I ever thought about doing, I didn't have the grades or the support to even think about going.

But after some personal circumstances changed I decided I really wanted to experience university life. An opportunity to leave behind my past and move into the future.

Luckily, I got the Unite Foundation scholarship which was such an important aid for my uni experience as it gave me support and safety. It took the pressure off.

For me university has been a very personal experience, I think of it now as a great stepping-stone to adulthood, it allows you to progress in a stable manner.

University gave me time to breathe and allowed me the space to grow, learn and figure out who I am. It gave me the chance to think big about my future and the time to plan it.
